Integrated crime and violence prevention strategy "A whole of government and whole of society approach"

The Integrated Crime and Violence Prevention Strategy (ICVPS) offers a whole of government and a whole of society approach to curb crime and interpersonal violence.

Crime, interpersonal violence and gender-based violence are amongst the most serious impediments to development in South Africa. These impediments are linked to the country's socio-economic challenges, characterised by extreme inequality and poverty, spatial segregation and high levels of unemployment. The impact of the risk factors to crime and violence on a person's life including the individual, community, structural, environmental, cultural and social dimensions hamper human and economic development.

Women are disproportionately affected by crime and violence in South Africa, particularly intimate partner violence, while rape and sexual violence have become hyperendemic.

Chapter 12 of the National Development Plan 2030 (NDP) puts a responsibility on government to develop and implement measures towards building safer communities. The 2016 White Paper on Safety and Security (WPSS) amplified this responsibility by giving a policy framework for collaboration of efforts by a variety of stakeholders in both the public and private sector to prevent crime and violence.

The ICVPS was approved by Cabinet in 2022 and provides clear deliverables, key actions, and performance indicator guides for departments

towards ensuring implementation at national, provincial and local government levels.

The strategy provides safety planners and practitioners with a clear implementation mechanism for an integrated response to the prevention of crime and violence, which is a necessary precondition for increasing people's feelings of safety and building safer communities, for sustainable economic growth and improved social development.

This integrated approach acknowledges the need for complimentary interventions to address a multiplicity of socio-economic factors that contributes towards crime and violence by addressing poverty, inequality, unemployment and improving social welfare, health and education.

Six Pillars of the ICVPS

The ICVPS recognises the centrality of crime and violence prevention and rests on the following six pillars:

- Active public and community participation
- Effective Criminal Justice System
- Victim Support
- Early Intervention to Prevent Crime and Violence and Promote Safety
- Effective and integrated service delivery for safety, security and prevention of violence
- Safety Through Environmental Design

AVAILABILITY OF DRAFT MANAGEMENT PLANS FOR THE CHILDS BANK, ORANGE SHELF EDGE, PORT ELIZABETH CORALS, AND AGULHAS FRONT MARINE PROTECTED AREAS FOR PUBLIC COMMENT

The Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment has developed draft management plans for Childs Bank, Orange Shelf Edge, Port Elizabeth Corals and Agulhas Front marine protected areas (MPAs). The draft Management Plans for the four MPAs have been completed in accordance with sections 39, 40 and 41 of the National Environmental Management: Protected Areas Act, 2003 (Act No. 57 of 2003) (Protected Areas Act). The management plans, as instruments in the Act, do not give or take away rights in the MPAs. The management plans are an important tool for the collective management of the MPAs and are key planning tool for the current and future management of MPAs.

The draft MPA management plans are available for public review and comment for a period of **thirty (30) days** after the publication of this notice in the newspaper. Any comments received after this date may not be considered.

ANNOUNCEMENT OF THE DEVELOPMENT OF A STRATEGIC ENVIRONMENTAL ASSESSMENT (SEA) FOR THE EXPANSION OF THE RENEWABLE ENERGY DEVELOPMENT ZONES: REQUEST TO REGISTER AS AN INTERESTED AND AFFECTED PARTY AND TO PARTICIPATE IN THE SEA PROCESS

The Department of Forestry, Fisheries and the Environment (DFFE) hereby informs all interested stakeholders of its intention to embark on a Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA) for the expansion of the Renewable Energy Development Zones (REDZs). This SEA expands the scope of Phase 1 and 2 of the Wind and Solar photovoltaic (PV) SEAs for the efficient and effective rollout of wind and solar PV energy in South Africa. The overall purpose of this SEA is to:

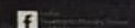
- reassess the boundaries of the Emalahleni and Beaufort West REDZs to determine the possibility of including additional areas along the boundaries;
- reassess five REDZs for accommodating wind energy technology (in addition to solar PV);
- investigate the potential to mitigate the electrocution risk for vultures from existing electricity distribution lines in the Stormberg and Cookhouse REDZs that utilise old design specifications, through a participatory approach.

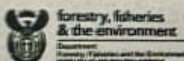
